CUSD Homework Philosophy

Homework is an integral part of student learning. The district supports a reasonable, balanced approach to homework. The amount of homework and the type of homework should logically progress toward independent, high level thinking tasks. The principal and staff at each school have developed, and regularly review, a school-site homework plan which includes guidelines for the assignment of homework and describes the responsibilities of students, staff and parents/guardians. In general:

For each grade level, the amount of time that students will be expected to spend on homework is approximately 6-10 minutes per year in school. For example: a student in grade 2 might expect to have 12-20 minutes of independent homework nightly. Students in grades 7 & 8 should expect to spend 42-80 minutes on independent homework. Students in high school should expect to spend anywhere from 30-90 minutes an evening on independent homework. Generally, secondary students will average no more than 90 minutes of homework nightly.

In addition to the independent homework, teachers from each grade level from K-8 may suggest parental involvement with their student's homework. For example: in Kindergarten, parents may be asked to read to their child for up to thirty minutes nightly. In most cases, the amount of necessary parental involvement will decrease as the student develops learning independence. However, parents are encouraged to adopt attitudes and habits which support student academic learning. A student who has no school-assigned homework will still benefit by reading, reviewing content, or practicing skills.

At the primary levels, student grades comprise _____ portion of the student's overall grade.

At the secondary level, homework comprises varying proportions of the class grade depending upon the content of the course and whether that content lends itself to extensive independent practice.

Parents should be aware that teachers plan homework based on the average student's capabilities. Some students may take much longer to complete the assignment. Other students with the same assignment may complete it in a very short amount of time. If your child reports that they have no homework, you are encouraged to direct them to reading quality books, reviewing class notes, or practicing academic skills. If your child is frequently taking much longer than expected to complete the homework, please contact the teacher. Accommodations and modifications can be made to assignments at the teacher's discretion.

Teachers at every level instruct students on how to allocate their time wisely, the importance of meeting deadlines, and developing good personal study habits.

Generally, students will have all the resources they need available at home. In some cases, as when they are learning research skills, students may be directed to certain web sites or print resources contained either in the school library, or available for access in the Public Library. A number of on-line homework assistance programs are available over the internet. Depending on the need and resources, the school or teacher may offer tutoring or other after-school assistance.

Elementary teachers will design homework assignments so that students do not receive an overload of homework one day and very little the next. Secondary teachers will make every effort to communicate with one another to avoid this situation. However, parents should understand that, occasionally, heavy loads of homework may result despite the teachers' best efforts to avoid this situation. Should your student experience frequent excessive homework, please contact the teacher.

Parents are encouraged to help their student organize and segment large homework assignments. A project due in two weeks may take 20 minutes per school night. But this could become 200 minutes of work in a single night if the student does not plan and complete the work in smaller segments.

Also, parents of students taking the most rigorous courses should be prepared to expect significantly higher homework loads. Advanced Placement courses are basically college classes taught in a high school setting. As such, the expectations for additional time commitment by the student are greatly increased.

- Californians recognize that schools are old, outdated, and require upgrades to meet health and safety standards, including seismic and other important mitigation measures. Funding these needs continues to be a top priority to voters, despite the state's fiscal challenges.

School Bond Talking Points

A state bond program can provide school facility equity.

- If only local bonds are used for school facilities, then school districts with the highest property wealth per student can provide the best facilities at the lowest tax rate.
- The Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) addresses education instructional program equality using state funds. The Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) addresses educational program outcome equity and school facilities being in good repair. Neither addresses school facility educational adequacy or efficiency.
- Just as state funds are used for instructional equity, state bond funds should be used for school facility equity and be corrected for local property wealth.
- Just as state funds for instructional equity are adjusted for the school districts' ability to
 pay for increased services to students from low-income areas, state bond funds can be
 allocated to reflect the communities' ability to pay and their local effort to pay for school
 facilities.
- Due to the variance in community property wealth, some districts will always be unable
 to access sufficient local funds to meet all their basic facilities needs. In such cases, the
 state serves as a safety net.

A State School Bond can leverage local school bonds to create more high paying construction jobs.

- The current state/local matching program could be adjusted to increase the local match to increase the state bond fund leverage. A state/local match percentage of \$1 state being matched by \$2 local would significantly increase the state bond leverage. Currently it is generally a \$1 to \$1 match.
- Each \$1.0 billion in bond funds creates 13,000 jobs. A four-year, \$8 billion state bond allocated at \$2 billion per year and matched by a local \$4 billion per year would generate 78,000 jobs per year. Those jobs and the sales tax on materials would increase state revenues that would help offset bond principle and redemption costs during the first 6 to 8 years.
- School projects typically can be under contract within 90 days. This means that state school bonds will not sit unused.

New and enhanced state funding sources do not meet all growing school facility needs.

- The combination of a residential construction market recovery and statewide average daily attendance growth means the new facility construction need is increasing in growing school districts.
- While LCFF is intended to "raise all boats," a system built on flexibility and subsidiarity
 means that facilities issues are subject to local prioritization; there is no dedicated
 funding stream. LCFF/LCAP create new unfunded facilities pressures, such as:
 - o Increased school reconstruction and renovation needs. This need is not related to the good repair requirements, but to the research documenting the

- relationship between natural lighting, indoor air quality and sound deadening, and academic achievement, which is valued in the outcomes-driven LCFF framework.
- o Additional classrooms to accommodate smaller class sizes. The class size research indicates that a 15:1 student-to-teacher ratio is more effective for low-income students' academic achievement than a 24:1 ratio. The LCFF can fund the teacher for a more successful class size, but it does not provide the money for a new classroom.
- Proposition 39 energy efficiency funds will help districts pursue important projects that
 have been on the back burner due to local priorities or lack of resources. These funds
 may be used for a relatively narrow range of energy projects and will not meet larger
 construction or renovation needs. Many of these projects will trigger further capital
 needs, such as ADA upgrades, which will depend upon other funding sources.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The Governing Board desires to prepare all students to obtain a high school diploma to enable them to take advantage of opportunities for postsecondary education and employment.

Course Requirements

To obtain a high school diploma, students shall complete at least the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year unless otherwise specified:

- 1. Three courses in English (Education Code 51225.3) (cf. 6142.91 Reading/Language Arts Instruction)
- 2. Two Three courses in mathematics (Education Code 51225.3) (This policy will be a requirement for graduation in 2017 and beyond.)

At least one mathematics course, or a combination of the two mathematic's courses required for completion in grades 9-12, shall meet or exceed state academic content standards for Algebra I. (Education Code 51224.5)

At least one mathematics course will be Personal Finance / Financial Literacy. (This policy will be a requirement for graduation in 2017 and beyond.)

Completion, prior to grade 9, of algebra coursework that meets or exceeds state academic content standards shall satisfy the algebra coursework requirement, but shall not exempt a student from the requirement to complete two mathematics courses in grades 9-12. (Education Code 51224.5)

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3. Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences (Education Code 51225.3)

Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

High School Exit Examination

As a condition of high school graduation, each student completing grade 12 shall have successfully passed the state exit examination in language arts and mathematics unless he/she receives a waiver or exemption. (Education Code 60851, 60859)

Supplemental instruction shall be offered to any student in grade 7-12 who does not demonstrate "sufficient progress," as defined in BP 6179 - Supplemental Instruction, toward passing the exit exam. (Education Code 37252, 60851)

Students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12 shall have the opportunity to receive intensive instruction and services for up to two consecutive academic years after completion of grade 12 or until they have passed both parts of the exam, whichever comes first. (Education Code 37254)

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board regarding the number of students who have fulfilled all local and state graduation requirements except for the passage of the exit exam and the resources that have been offered to such students.

Certificates of Completion

Students who have passed all the district's course requirements by the end of their senior year but are unable to pass the high school exit exam shall receive a certificate of completion.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board regarding the number of students receiving a certificate of completion and the resources that have been offered to such students.

Retroactive Diplomas

The district may retroactively grant a high school diploma to a former student who was interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who is an honorably discharged veteran of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that he/she was enrolled in a district school immediately preceding the internment or military service and he/she did not receive a diploma because his/her education was interrupted due to the internment or military service. (Education Code 51430)

The district also may retroactively grant a diploma to a deceased former student who satisfies the above conditions. The diploma shall be received by the deceased student's next of kin. (Education Code 51430)

In addition, the district may grant a diploma to a veteran who entered the military service of the United States while he/she was a district student in grade 12 and who had completed the first half of the work required for grade 12. (Education Code 51440)

March 18, 2014, 6:00 p.m.

OPEN SESSION
CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. in the Colusa Unified School District Conference Room by Board President Charles Yerxa, and established a quorum was present. Attending were Charles Yerxa, Lincoln Forry, Don Bransford and Terry Bressler. Kelli Griffith-Garcia was absent. Also in attendance were Superintendent Dwayne Newman, and Business Manager Sheryl Bailey; Principals Tarr, Johnston and Brown, students, staff, and parents. Lori Raineri and Stacie Frerichs from Government Financial Strategies, Inc. and Gene Bregman from Gene Bregman & Associates were also present.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Taylor Davies led the Pledge of Allegiance.

HEARING OF PUBLIC

None

STUDENT'S REPORT

Taylor Davies reported on activities taking place at Colusa High School which included senior projects, FBLA section conference results, Sport team results and upcoming tournaments, CRAF Golf Tournament on April 18, and Graduation on May 30.

RECOGNITIONS AND CELEBRATIONS

This month Dave Tarr acknowledged his entire Kindergarten staff, along with Ellen Cenami, Reading Specialist, for their interest and enthusiasm in starting the kindergarten extended day program at Burchfield. After which Trisha Haugh and Cristina Rodriguez praised Dave Tarr for his leadership at Burchfield Primary School. Darren Brown recognized Matt Giffin for his work being an ESA advisor, and also for taking the English students to Ashland, Oregon each year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Mr. Yerxa echoed Taylor Davies' report of the upcoming CRAF golf tournament on April 18, 2014.

BOARD OF TRUSTEE TIME

None

It was decided to change the start time for the April Board Meeting to 4 p.m. to have a reception for the newly tenured teachers.

PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY RESULTS

Gene Bregman from Gene Bregman & Associates showed the Board summary charts of the results from a phone survey of likely voters in the Colusa Unified School District. He stated that the majority of the people polled were in favor of an election and of voting YES in that election. A discussion was held and it was suggested that professional consultants should be brought in to help get the word out to the voters about the reasons for the bond.

Lori Raineri and Stacie Frerichs from Government Financial Strategies, Inc. reiterated what had been accomplished since they were hired to advise CUSD on a bond measure. They stated a facilities needs assessment had been done and it showed we have more than \$35 million in needs. A public opinion survey had been conducted which showed that those people surveyed agreed the schools needed more money to

repair, rehabilitate and modernize the local schools. A discussion was held. A concern was brought up regarding the current water situation and that not only farmers but other entities in the county would be affected because of the lack of water this summer. Money will be tight and whether or not a bond measure would pass is a big concern.

After the discussion, Mr. Newman said we would put an action item on the June board agenda to adopt a resolution regarding a bond election.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Improving Achievement:

• Update on Current Improvement Plan Progress: Mr. Newman stated we were doing what we said we would do. He will be having a data meeting with the principals next month to look at student achievement data. The focus is on planning for next year and making sure our LCAP is being done well. There are many groups that Mr. Newman is mandated to meet with. He met with Bobby Kirkman who is doing a phenomenal job with his Leadership group at the high school with regards to LCAP. Mr. Newman will be meeting with the union groups and will have a discussion with them also. After meeting with all the groups, he will put all the ideas together and figure out what plans to make for next year.

Management -

Update on SELPA Plan Revision, Community Day School, Opportunity School: Mr. Newman recommends housing the Community School in the old kindergarten building on 6th St. at least for a year or so. He feels that by doing this we will save ourselves, and other districts in the county, a lot of money. Currently the ASES program is in that building, but that is after school is out and the Community School students would be gone by the time ASES starts. Sheryl Bailey brought up that Community School has to be at least 6 hours long. A discussion was held with regards to safety of Burchfield and Head Start students because they are in close proximity to the Community School students who could have dangerous tendencies. Mr. Bransford suggested that he would like the Community School housed away from the schools, possibly in another building in town. Newman expressed that he didn't think they would be a threat to any of the Mr. Newman will talk to the other students who are in close proximity. Superintendents in the County tomorrow on this topic and will report back their thoughts.

Mr. Newman will be meeting with the county Superintendents tomorrow regarding the SELPA program. They will focus on coming up with wording that will allow us to keep the SELPA here, but allow districts to have sufficient controls so that the county can't make a unilateral decision and incur additional costs if the districts don't agree with it. Also, the plan will include wording to get control on the County's salary schedule for SELPA personnel.

- Update on Grounds Committee Meeting: Mr. Newman reported the grounds committee met and saw that the athletic fields were in good shape.
- CHS Ag Program Tractor Purchase: Donors are needed for the Ag. Dept. to purchase a tractor. Mr. Crabtree was present and said he would like to keep the purchase local. Mr. Bransford asked what type of tractor he needed and Tim replied a 60 hp, with 4-wheel drive. Mr. Bransford asked how often the Friends

of Ag. committee meets and Tim said they meet once a year. Mr. Bransford suggested the FoA Committee meet at least 3 or 4 times each year to be able to get them on board with the needs of the Ag. Dept. by having fund raising projects, and/or soliciting donations for the department. Mr. Crabtree stated there is also a strong alumni fund that donates money to FoA. Mr. Crabtree has solicited bids from all tractor companies in Colusa, as well as Chico just to be able to compare prices. A discussion was held on whether or not to use Perkins money or LCFF for the tractor purchase. No decision was made.

Budget:

- Update on progress of ZBB Mr. Newman said to remember that the budget is built from the bottom up and that typically the budget numbers will come back very high, then we'll need to go back and make it all fit district wide. (He doesn't want people to panic when they see the original numbers that will be submitted.)
- Mr. Newman said the state's revenue budget is 1.6% higher than what was projected. Also, there is overwhelming support for additional funding for the Common Core Implementation Grant which will help us in technology and curriculum.
- MS Settlement Grant: We have moved some of our billing from what was the Common Core Grant into the MS Settlement Grant so that we can continue to use the Common Core Grant for tech. and curriculum writing.

Enrollment: Mr. Newman stated our enrollment is down 1 student, but our a.d.a. is significantly up overall.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

For his school report Mr. Tarr talked about the extended day kindergarten program at Burchfield Primary School. His handouts to the Board included a 10 year demographic summary stating that in 2003 there were 50% Hispanic students at BPS and now there are 72%, which is a 22% increase. He stated the 2003 CELDT scores of 1/2 were 38%, and in 2012 they were 82%, a significant change. This means that we have more ELL coming to school at a lower level of English Proficiency than we have seen in the past. The first grade assessment results summary in the fall of 2013 showed student scores decline over the summer. However, students are now leaving Kindergarten with a higher level of skills and will come into first grade at a higher level than previously observed. This is a normal occurrence which happens at all grade levels. The BPS teachers are working to minimize this problem by creating a packet of practice materials the students will receive at the end of the school year. Each child will then have a chance to practice academic skills over the summer to maintain the levels they've achieved during the school year.

Mr. Tarr also reported there were 79 students who signed up at kindergarten preregistration. There are 18 TK and 14 known incoming students who have not made appointments totaling 111 so far for the 2014-15 school year. He wants to continue to keep the class ratio of 20 to 1.

Don Bransford asked questions of Mr. Tarr regarding whether or not there was enough resources in the classroom for students to get the individual help they needed. Mr. Tarr explained the scheduling of the para-educators and said in his ZBB he would like to double the amount of para-educators who would help in student learning.

Pam Giuliano reported that the 6th graders just got back from Shady Creek and had a really good time. The kids showed excellent behavior throughout the week.

CEA REPORT

She also reported she had gone to a CEA dinner meeting where she normally hears negative comments from other educators in other school districts. She was glad that the relationship between the teachers and the administration in our school district was very good. Pam stated there are many great things here at CUSD.
